How this works: the assignment is actually a four-part project that is designed to create an informed conversation about inflation, economics and the reality of the cost of doing business and cost of living.

Part B:

But why would these things cost more than they used to? What kinds of things can affect those costs? We are looking at how Canada has had to increase wages over time for the same job, and how minimum wage workers are being overwhelmed by changes in the cost of living.

How this works:

There is a set of data below that details a comparison between two people, one making a 'living wage', the other making 'minimum wage' with the same costs.

Dan and Shauna both live in apartments with the same costs per month. Shauna makes \$35/hr, and Dan makes \$15/hr.

Monthly costs:

Rent is \$2250 a month Electricity is \$160 a month Oil heat is \$200 a month Internet is \$40 a month Cellphone is \$90 a month Food is \$150 a week

- 1. Imagine the lives of both Dan and Shauna, and tell us a story that compares how it is to live as each of them because of the wages and costs. (Two paragraphs for each of them)
- 2. If a third person in 1915 works and can afford to pay for a house for themselves and their family, they have power, eat well, but cannot afford to go on a vacation once a year- what does that say about the cost of living and inflation for them versus today and the buying power of the dollar?
